"He makes it cool; he is a great spokesman for autism," football coach **Mr. Robinson** said. "A lot of people shy away from it because they don't know what it's about; but George really brings coolness to autism."

Assistant coach **Mr. Beler** has also noticed Knoth's leadership on and off the field.

"George has a very strong foundation, from his character to his faith," Beler said. "He has incredible faith in his family and brothers; they do a good job working together, and that character has carried over to the football field.

This award has meant a lot to Knoth's teammates as well, such as junior **Tim Maher.**

"George's award is more of an honor than anything else," Maher said. "Kids like George are the kids who everyone should be cheering for and talking about."

Over his four years at Law, Knoth has taken an active role in providing for his brothers.

"My parents work incredibly hard to provide for us," Knoth said. "I don't want them to come home and feel more pressured to take care of my brothers, so I try to take as much of that responsibility as I can."

Knoth has also been recognized by people outside

the Jonathan Law community for his outstanding leadership qualities. One of these people is Hillhouse coach Tom Dyer.

"What he's done for his family and community, those are the type of young men that really we should be hearing more about," Dyer said.

Knoth was recently a candidate for the Timex Heart of a Giant Award. Despite coming up short in the voting for that award, Knoth could not be more thankful for winning the UCAN Inspire award.

"I was much more excited to win this award, to be honest," Knoth said. "Everybody has heard of Walter Camp, and it's such a privilege to be affiliated with them."

More important than anything, Knoth wanted people to create awareness for autism.

"I hope that by hearing my story, people will realize how special kids with autism are," Knoth said. "They are the most loving people you will ever meet, and they just need to be loved in return."


"We even learned hw to have proper British teatime, such as manners and etiquette," said junior **Amanda DeLeo**, who played Lane.

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New Schedule Brings Pros, Cons

Each school year presents students at Law. a series of changes for Law's students, but the 2013-2014 school year will be bringing a modification that will change the fabric of a school day.

Beginning next year, Law will be switching to a "modified block schedule" that has a six day rotation in school days. On A, B, D, and E Days, there will be five 57 minute classes and one 78 minute class. On C and F Days, there will be four 78 minute classes and Common

This idea presents a large array of pros and cons in terms of preparing for the future. The schedule will create benefits in the near future for students, as longer classes will resemble multiple hour- long classes that are commonplace in college. Students who have been accustomed to 45 minute classes will learn to be prepared and learned to stay focused and a sharp mind for hours at a time. For the next few years, the 78 minute classes will be great practice for retaining large amounts of information, while outlasting the long length of the periods.

The new schedule also helps in the short term, as it fixes a common complaint for many underclassmen: lack of schedule flexibility. The new schedule adds an extra class choice for all students in order to allow them to explore many opportunities that weren't available for freshmen and sophomores before.

Extra courses have been developed for next year and extra electives will be offered next year, which are both positive changes for all

Finally, in terms of the specific classes themselves under this schedule, teachers will be the most happy for the time extension. Many of Law's teachers that cover complex subjects have to split chapters and lessons over multiple days which ends up proving less effective for their students. Getting an entire lesson plan into one session eliminates having to spend a length of a class recapping the previous day and taking advantage of every minute instead.

Though the new schedule seems to offer an unlimited amount of positives for students and staff alike, some issues will definitely arise, though they are limited. While this plan will prove to extend the success of hard working students, for those that fall behind the work will be tougher.

There is no problem with separating those that put in effort and those that slack via a new schedule plan, but the work for teachers will be even harder. Teachers will have to put double the effort in to catching some students up which will result in extra time after school for help as well. This in turn could create a chain reaction leading to worse grades.

Other issues revolve around students who are sick on these longer class days. This could lead to large amounts of work to catch up on. If the teacher is absent, double the amount of lesson will be lost, rather than just 45 minutes now.

All in all, the new scheduling plan has a lot of positives, but adjustment will likely be a long process for all current underclassmen.

China's Social Networking Ban For Citizens Goes Too Far

These days, there is probably no one who can live without social media like Twitter, Facebook, and Youtube.

Surprisingly, there are 1.6 billion people who have no access to these networking sites, yet still are living normal lives. This is only possible in the extremely communist country of China, which claims the world's largest population of over one billion people.

China says that its strict online censorship policies are in place to maintain social stability, and to stop the spread of fabricated material.

China blocked Facebook in 2009 after the Urumgi riots since Xinjian independence activists used Facebook for communication. Then, China created Renren, which is a social network similar to Facebook, but is constantly filtered by the government.

After advocates of the Dalai Lama fabricated a video showing Chinese police beating Tibetans after some riots, and uploading the video onto Youtube, the Chinese government banned citizens' access to Youtube. China is so communistic that it has even blocked certain parts of Google.

Some Chinese citizens may be fine with not having access to the networking sites that the

rest of the world has access to, but some people are not happy.

For example, Kai-Fu Lee, who used to work at Google China, announced February 17, 2013 that he was banned for three days "from China's popular Twitter-like Weibo Services, Sina and Tencent, where he has a whopping 30 million and 24 million followers respectively."

The ban was placed for no apparent reason, and although Lee had no problem with the ban, those millions of followers felt frustrated that they could not access the only limited freedom they had to connect with the people they look up to. This frustration among some citizens has caused Chinese Internet users to take advantage of a glitch in the country's censorship so they can have more freedom and do what they like. As long as the users used HTTPS instead of HTTP in the web address, they were able to access Facebook.

"We've seen glitches for a few hours, or even a few days, before. Unfortunately, things don't seem to come back from the dead. Not since 2009, when things got much stricter in terms of web filtering. So I'd err on the side of caution and say, unfortunately, it's just a glitch, so enjoy it while you can," said Steven Millward, China editor at TechAsia.com.

Up to 700,00 people in

China are using Facebook behind their government's back, by using a glitch. No citizen should have to ever break a law in order to connect with friends and family around the world. Facebook, Youtube, and Twitter are simply websites where people can have fun and keep in touch with things going on around the world. Sure, blocking these website can prevent false rumors from spreading around, but China is just creating more rebels instead of preventing them by banning Facebook. If people are misusing these websites, Chinese government should block those specific people instead of punishing the whole country.

Facebook founder Mark Zuckerberg tried making business in China, and was appalled that the country did not want its citizens to have access to Facebook. Today, without websites like Facebook, people would never be able to maintain relationships, connect with new people, or even make business. Facebook's other social networking sites' purpose is to get the whole world to connect with each other, but China is impeding this goal by preventing its 1.6 billion citizens from having this privilege.


One of the songs on the album is called "1 Train" and features Kendrick Lamar and many other rappers. It is the


"Monk" is a TV series on the USA network, produced by Andy Breckman. The series is full of drama, mystery, crime, and of course, comedy.

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
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Kendrick Hits Right Notes In 'Pitch Perfect'


The NHL season just kicked off, and now there is a video game that is practically like the real thing.

For this reason as more, "NHL 2013" is obviously the best hockey game on the market right now. This game also





'Dead Space 3' Continues Horror Adventure



The Necromorphs of the "Dead Space" series changed the face of fear. The first game in the series focused on this fear and utilized it to scare the crap out of any gamer that put the game in his console. The sequel was almost equally as terrifying as the original. It kept the same close quarters environments and delivered the same close encounter scares but with a larger world to venture. It also went in deeper to the storyline that the first created. The final battle, the ending cut scene, and the extra after the credits left gamers wanting to know what was next for our hero.

When the release date for "Dead Space 3" was given out to the world, gamers were pretty skeptical. The setting of the game looked like it was completely changing from the dark and close environments to a bright, open world on the new planet of Tau Volantis. Also, gamers wondered how Visceral Games would create new scares for them. After two long games filled with enemies popping out of vents and creeping through the dark, it would be hard to catch anyone off guard since the scenarios in which attacks come were all pretty much known.

"Dead Space 3" blew away all doubts about the game. The only piece of the game that gave off a different feel than previous "Dead Space" games was the beginning where gamers fight off Unitologist soldiers as they help Isaac escape from them. Immediately after this beginning chapter, gamers are immersed straight back into the familiar world of this game franchise. The favorite scene from "Dead Space 2" of Isaac flying through space dodging debris is the first scene replicated as your ship is blown apart by mines and Isaac is separated from his group. Quickly after, gamers are right back in those dark hallways walking gingerly around dark corners awaiting the imminent scare by Necromorphs as Isaac explores the remains of 200 year old ships floating above the planet. During one mission aboard these four ancient ships, gamers even are pitted against the infamous Ubermorph, or regenerating Necromorph, which never fails to scare through the dimly lit, cramped hallways as he chases Isaac down.

A scene new to the series that amazed almost everyone was the flight down to the planet. Gamers had to control the flight of the ship as it descended down to the planet keeping it in line with the course by staying within certain square boundaries while at the same time shooting down mines and

debris that would otherwise collide with the ship. Usually, crash scenes are a part of a cut scene where gamers standby as all the action occurs. Being able to be in charge of the ship as it plummeted and crash landed is one thing that makes "Dead Space 3" stand out.

An extra to this game that wasn't available before is the option to do what is called "Optional Missions." These missions, as the name suggests, are not required to complete the game. Gamers can choose to complete them or ignore them; however, there are always supplies or info waiting for Isaac at the end. Each mission usually supplies gamers with circuits (the items used to upgrade weapons), ammo, and supply boxes with resources to build and upgrade.

One of the most anticipated parts of the game revealed before its release was that gamers don't need to go into the fret alone. "Dead Space 3" doesn't only have a Single Player Campaign but also a Co-op Campaign. Each campaign follows the same general story and has the same ending; however a lot of cut scenes and optional missions are available only in the Co-op Campaign. John Carver, the character controlled by the second player in co-op, is the reason for these extra missions and cut scenes. In the Single Player Campaign, John Carver is still a character in the game; however, he only interacts with gamers through cut scenes and parts of the game with no danger. During Co-op, he follows Isaac around through the entire game and something interesting and unique to this campaign happens. The player who is in control of John Carver can actually see things that the player in control of Isaac can't. This can be related to how Isaac was able to see Nicole Brennan, his dead girlfriend, in "Dead Space 2" except it's not exactly the same. What Carver sees are images of his child and wife whom died before the events of this game

during a Marker uprising. The optional missions that branch off from the main story in Co-op mode are extenuations of Carver's story and how he is personally affected by the events of this game. Just as Isaac faced Nicole, his Marker created demon, Carver faces his own throughout this game alongside Isaac.

The Weapons System and Bench has been completely overhauled in "Dead Space 3." In the previous two Dead Space titles, players would find schematics for weapons which they can then bring to a Store to buy. From there, they could bring weapons to a Bench to add Power Nodes to them in order to give them upgraded abilities. Now, the Visceral team completely scrapped the Store and credits system to buy guns and items. Everything is now made through resources and frames. Gamers can literally build their own personalized gun with an upper tool and a lower tool to fit their style for cutting down Necromorphs. If a gamer has a preference to the original weapons from the original games, blueprints can be found throughout the game to bring to the bench. From there, they can construct each weapon using resources found everywhere throughout the game from Necromorph bodies to loot found at the end of Optional Missions. A few different resources that can be found are Scrap Metal, Tungsten, and Semiconductors. These resources not only can be used to create weapons from Blueprints but can be a replacement to credits and Power Nodes. Certain resources can be used to create health packs, ammo, and Statis Packs. Also, even though Circuits are used to upgrade guns, resources can be used to build circuits to be used to upgrade weapons. The uses for resources don't end there. Since the Store no longer exists, Isaac and Carver need a new place to change suits. A new station called the "Suit Kiosk" contains all suits each player

can change into and also acts as the place where players' suit can be upgraded. Health, Air, Armor, Statis, and Kinesis can all be upgraded at this station through the various types of resources that players collect.

One small change to the way characters can move made one big change to the engagement of Necromorphs. Gamers can now make Isaac and Carver roll forward, back, or to either side. It sounds like a small concept, but when a Slasher is reaching out at Isaac for an execution or a Puker is shooting his puke directly at Carver, being able to dodge roll to the side can be the difference between life and being brutally ripped apart.


The Unitologist soldiers were a good thought to bring into the game, but fights against them didn't often play out as epic as they were acclaimed to be. First of all, the AIs controlling the Unitologists are really dumb. When they clearly outnumber Isaac, they continuously get up from cover and run to a different spot that half the time is no closer than where they were before. Second, the majority of the fights where Unitologists appear, Necromorphs appear too, however,

they attack the Unitologists. If the gamer lets them fight it out, they will all kill each other. Usually, one soldier or Necromorph survives who then goes after the gamer, but sometimes the last Necromorph and soldier end up killing each other leaving the gamer to walk through, collect ammo, and move on unscathed. Another thing that wasn't thought out well is the cover system. When Isaac or Carver is behind something that can be used as cover, the gamer can hit the "LT" button on the Xbox Controller to shield himself behind that cover. If they aim while behind cover, they can aim their weapon over the cover and aim it around in different places. However, once they are behind this cover, they cannot move left or right unless they leave the cover and move over. It is a minor detail, but can become very annoying in fire fights. "Dead Space" is not a "Call of Duty" or Battlefield," so their cover system isn't their primary focus, but it wasn't perfected as it could have been to fit the setting of the fire fights in the game.

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"Dead Space" has never disappointed before and the third installment has definitely followed this trend. Despite the disappointments from the Unitologists and imperfections from the over system, Visceral pulled out all the stops in order to keep the "Dead Space" feel throughout the game and to create new scares and heartpounding fights. The new customizations and abilities really add to the experience and help get immersed in this new world. If none of these changes are enough for a fan out there, the story is definitely worth the buy. The ending will evoke many emotions and the special secret after the credits will evoke even more. This title lives up to the legacy and deserves all the praise it has received.




