The show is still looking for a network to air on.

"My goal is to have my music on a popular fishing show," said Morazzini. "I think my music is fun and high energy music that would go well on a lot of the fishing shows I see."

With the probable future success of the show "Going Ike," Morazzini's goal can be achieved.

Morazzini first started lis-

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AP Classes Bring Unnecessary Stress

It is that time of year again. AP tests are just around the corner and students are already freaking out.

Those two weeks of AP testing are torture for many of Law's students. Some students may have to take up to two tests a day, which can lead to a total of about six hours of testing.

Also, it is spring time, meaning there are tons of spring sports going on. This means that some students may have games and practices on days of AP testing that they must attend.

This is all nothing but extreme stress and pressure on students.

Some students, for example, may have six hours of AP testing with absolutely no break for lunch except for a quick snack break.

This is the situation facing tons of students around the country early next month. AP tests are ridiculously long and they cause nothing but stress. Students spend the whole school year studying for one test.

If they don't do well for approximately three hours, many feel as if they have wasted their whole school year.

At Choate, a private school in Connecticut, the testing coordinator commented on how "approximately 765 AP" were given in 2011, which is "slightly lower than the 816" given the year before.

The pressure of AP tests is so much that kids, even hardworking and intelligent

kids from Choate, are dropping out of AP tests.

Much has been written about the past few years about the course load of AP classes and whether or not these classes, in the long run, are hurting students more than they are helping them.

"The AP pile-on is helping turn the teenage years into a rat race where learning becomes a calculated means to an end rather than a chance for in-depth investigation," wrote the New York Time education reporter, Joe Berger in his article "Demoting Advanced Placement."

Berger's argument is a good one. Stress from trying to get a four or five on the AP tests deteriorates students in the long run. AP classes have gotten so intense that Choate's competitor, Philips Exeter Academy, stated on its website that it does not offer AP courses at all anymore.

If schools like Choate, that are known for their academic rigor, are getting rid of AP testing, why can't all schools in the United States do the same? Why wouldn't they?

The odds that educators and the College Board will get rid of AP's are next to impossible, because these academic tests have built up prestige and have become a barometer to compare high school students and a way for high school students to earn college credit.

The truth is, though, that AP tests should not be weighted as heavily as they are. The stresses that come with these tests far outweigh their academic merit.

Law Schools Right In Helping Students Reduce Loans

The field of law is a very important and beneficial field, considering that law is what teaches us right from wrong. Therefore, one would think that there would be a lot of people who would want to major in this crucial field, but that is not exactly true today.

The high cost of tuition and the large number of years required to go to law school in order to get a degree, is the reason many students are backing out of going to law school.

Tuition costs more than \$40,000 a year even though 47% of schools have increased the amount of financial aid they offer during the year of 2012-2013.

Most law schools require students to attend for three years in order to obtain a degree, which amounts to more than \$120,000 for those three years.

Considering that the job market is dwindling and leaving no jobs at law firms, it is not even worth it to spend so much money for a job position that may never open up.

Fortunately, in order to help law students cut down on loans and debts, states such as New York are working to cut out a year of law school.

States are proposing an amendment to allow students to take the state bar exam a year earlier if they want.

This way, students won't have to pay another \$40,000 for the third year, which most

consider to be useless and boring anyway.

The third year is so unnecessary in many cases that class attendance drops rapidly.

With the new proposal, students can opt to study a third year, which will consist of internships and job experiences so that students can train for real world work situations instead of wasting time and money in a classroom for a third year.

Those that don't have money can just go to school for two years and head straight out to the work field to find a job, if there are any.

Even if they don't find a job, at least they don't have another \$40,000 to pay in student debts.

Money does not grow on

trees, and all of those who are in college or about to go to college know exactly what it is like to pay thousands and thousands of dollars every year.

Learning should never be costing so much money, but there is nothing we can do but accept it.

At least with these new amendments, the cost of learning will reduce, and students won't have to spend years after college spending time paying all debts.

An ideal situation would be if college tuition would reduce for all majors, easing the lives of many students around the country.

Board Makes Changes To Milford School Calendar

Drastic changes might be coming to the Milford School district schedule in 2013-2014.

Milford has proposed a new school schedule that will remove certain holidays and vacations in order to save school days. These proposed changes aren't official, but would tentatively end the 2013-2014 school year on June 5.

"The best part of the new schedule idea is the new end date," said junior **Ben Buczek**. "A longer summer is better than the other days we used to have off."

The district set out a goal this year to capture days for several reasons, but was quite obviously motivated by the massive amount of days that have been cancelled for weather this past year. The district also cited that it would provide fewer interruptions for students to improve the flow of a school year.

In order to gain the pulse of students and staff alike, a survey was sent out that over 3,500 people responded to. Most polls offered close contests in favor and against using days that were previously unused. Another noticeable trend was the difference and response between parents and the staff.

The first question directed to the parents and staff was whether or not the school year should start two days earlier, which would mean students report on August 28th. Parents responded with a majority of 52.6% saying 'Yes' and 32.9%

saying 'No'.

Though on the staff side of this proposal, teachers would be required to report on August 26th, and this showed in the response. Staff voted with a 56% 'No' to coming in earlier over 35% 'Yes'. The mixed response has kept the idea possible, but it will most likely remain how it was in 2012-2013.

Staff and parents were more in agreement on their response for whether to keep the Jewish holiday Rosh Hashanah. Parents voted 80% 'Yes' for remaining open and staff followed with 68%. Milford has proposed to eliminate the day off, but will allowed those of the Jewish faith to take an excused day off if necessary.

The district has also proposed that schools will be open on Columbus Day, though the results were less of a huge majority. Parents voted 'Yes' to staying open in a 66% majority, while staff only voted with a 50% majority. Milford has also committed to opening

on Veteran's Day after another small majority between respondents.

The district would commit those days to lessons on Columbus and on America's veterans should this schedule be accepted.

"I have no issue with school's being open on days like Columbus and Veteran's Day," said junior **Trace Malone**. "It is only a few missed days so it isn't a big difference anyway."

The most split opinion came from the decision on what to do with February vacation. Ideas on the survey included keeping it how it is, getting rid of it completely, and various four-day weekends.

The decision that gained the most support was a 4-day weekend that gets rid of a Friday and the following Monday. This would gain three days that would usually be in June. This vacation would take place starting the weekend before President's Day.

"Having a four day February vacation is better than a full nine days off," said **Mr. Kulenych**. "The vacation we had wasn't really necessary in the first place. It's right after midterms and it interrupts the start of a new semester."

This new schedule would leave a cushion for many more snow days to fall back on. It would allow the last possible day before vacation days would be taken away to be June 20.

This new schedule is not yet officially in place, but it will be debated and most likely voted on this month.

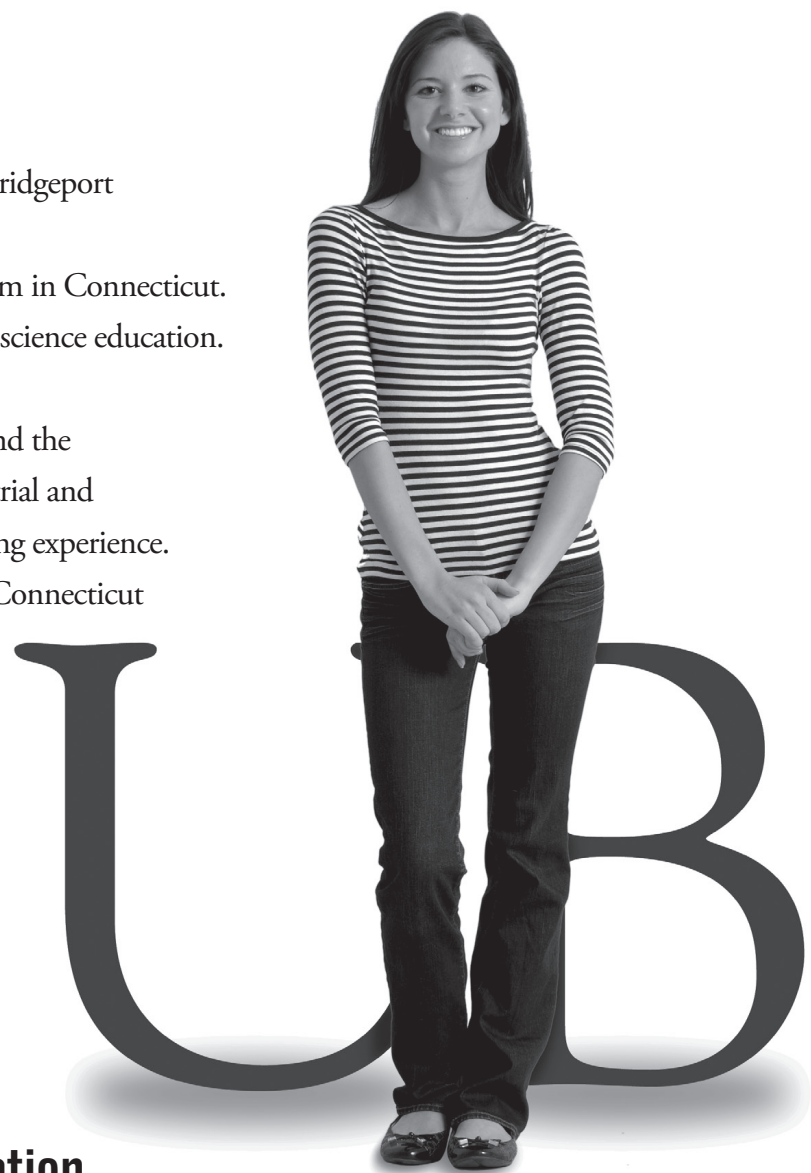
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Tyler, The Creator Shows Skills On 'Wolf'

Tyler, the Creator has been known more for controversial lyrics than his actual music as a whole in the past. But with his newest album's release, his full set of skills might be taken more seriously by the general public.

Odd Future co-founder Tyler Okonma released his third album "Wolf" on April 2 with a completely new set of subject matter from his 2011 release "Goblin". Though a successful album, "Goblin" was a very loud, brash album that gained attention from many for alleged homophobia and misogyny on popular songs like "Yonkers" and "Radicals". Though Tyler doesn't back away from being honest on "Wolf", the theme is a bit toned down.

"Wolf" was first and foremost for Tyler, not a 'rap' album. Since production began in 2011 he had always insisted that the beats and sound would be the biggest focus of the album, and would reject the title of a 'rapper' by media outlets.

Though the focus on the beats is apparent, Tyler is still most definitely leaning towards scolding rhymes and impressive wordplay on several tracks. The prime example of this is "Wolf's" lead single "Domo 23" where the primary focus is playful, comedic lines about the money he has made and his critics. The album also has the song "Trashwang", a parody

of a rap song you might find coming from Maybach Music Group. The track is hilarious with a bunch of features from non-rappers Jasper Dolphin, Taco, and Na-kel.

Several topics are prevalent on the album, including his lack of having a father in his life that is covered in the heartfelt track "Answer". A rare slow song, it centers on a false phone call to his absent dad, and the anger and sadness it had given him. Though not as lyrically sharp, it replaces metaphors and imagery with emotion along with fellow OF member Syd Tha Kid's soft vocals to make it one of the best

songs on the album.

Another theme is the loss of his grandmother that is the focus of "Lone". Tyler raps at a laid back pace, but mixing in more raw emotion from his loss and his struggles with fame, and closes out the album well.

The theme Tyler succeeds and, coincidentally, uses most are struggles and involvements with romance. "IFHY" features Tyler's idol Pharrell Williams and the song's character's lack of ability to "keep his emotions bubbled" while talking about someone he loves and hates at the same time. "Awkward" also uses a beat pitched Tyler to de-

scribe a former romance, where he, as usual, isn't afraid to be detailed about his interactions.

Every song on "Wolf" is worth a listen due to the unique prospects that they bring, though not as rough and loud as "Goblin" was. He brings childhood nostalgia to the listener with jazzy track "Treehome95" and "Slater" which is about Tyler's childhood bike. Grammy winning Frank Ocean makes an appearance on "Slater" and "48" and only improves them with his hypnotic voice.

Tyler and fellow OF members remain lyrically scolding on the louder tracks on "Wolf"

including great efforts by Domo Genesis and Earl Sweatshirt on "Rusty" and easily the best feature verse by Hodgy Beats on "Jamba". One of the lesser tracks "Parking Lot" features an OK verse from Mike G, and subjects former OF member Casey Veggies to only being a part of the hook instead of a verse.

Finally, two of the most intriguing tracks on the album are "Tamale" and "PartyIsntOver/Campfire/Bimmer". Tyler familiarly uses a song like "Tamale" to mock pop culture and his critics in hilarious ways, but the fast flow and beat deliver a sound new for him that provides an exciting listen. "PartyIsntOver/Campfire/Bimmer" splits three small segments into one song, and each is unique. "PartyIsntOver" is a bit repetitive but TK, while "Campfire" provides a scene from a camp site with a soft chorus of children to top it off. But the final part "Bimmer" offers the catchiest lines of the album with more assistance from Frank Ocean once again. This section of the song only clocks in at just barely two minutes, and definitely calls for more, or even better, its own song.

"Wolf" might not please some of Tyler's old fans with the new range of sound he taps into at some times, but for those who can accept it, it is an enjoyable listen.

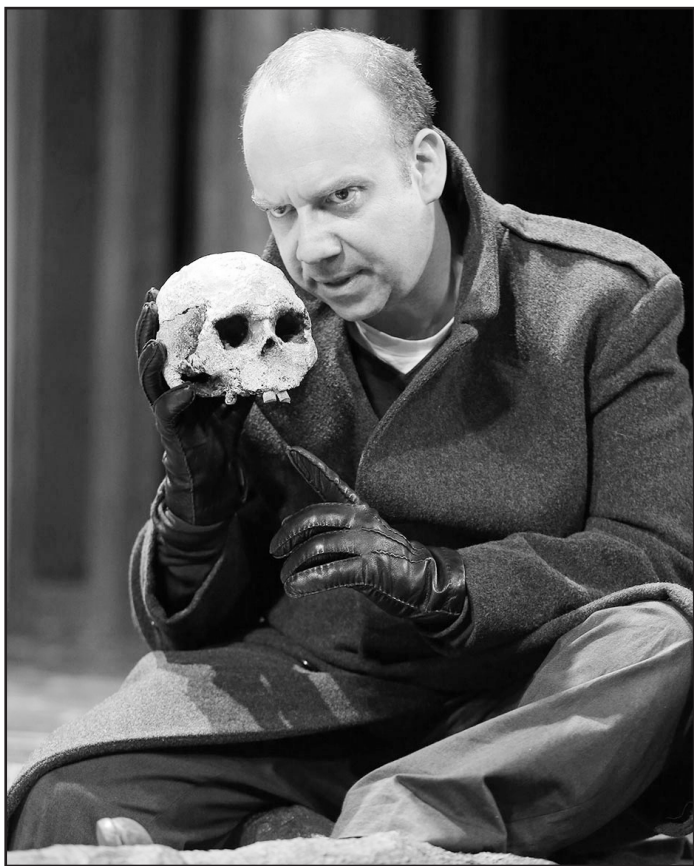
out of mine/ It's just a waste of time/ I know you'll never end up with me, so I won't even try/ And you say its cause of me that we're not friends at all."

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'Bioshock Infinite' Up For Game Of The Year

When a gamer thinks of the title "Bioshock," that person would probably think of the underwater utopia of Rapture or the Big Daddys and Little Sisters who roamed the city. Three years ago, thinking that 2K and Irrational Games could make a Bioshock without Rapture and its two most iconic characters was unthinkable, but the unthinkable was made into reality with the release of "Bioshock Infinite," the third installment in the "Bioshock" series, on March 26th this year.

When the Irrational team first decided to make a third Bioshock they did explore other possibilities for games down in Rapture because they saw it as the iconic setting for the series. However, once things started seeming like repeats of the previous two games, they started to explore other possible setting and the floating sky-city of Columbia was born.

Not only is the game in an entirely different setting, but it also takes place during a completely different time period. Infinite occurs in the year 1912 during the period of American Exceptionalism.

Gamers assume the role of ex-Pinkerton agent Booker DeWitt who has fallen into a great deal of debt with some bad people. In order to pay off this debt, Booker must rescue a girl named Elizabeth and take her to New York City. The journey starts with two odd people rowing Booker out to a lighthouse. After climbing the tower, he is strapped down in a chair in a canister like a miniature rocket. Once Booker experiences Ascension, he is exposed for the first time to Columbia. It all seems like a paradise at first with carnival games, friendly citizens, and drinks that give you special abilities called Vigors; however, this dream world changes into living hell once Booker is classified as the "False Prophet," by the "AD" branded on his right hand. After that, the whole city is after his head for fear he'll take away the "Seed of the Prophet," Elizabeth. Booker eventually makes his way to Monument Island, the island where Elizabeth is trapped on. After he breaks in and narrowly escapes with Elizabeth, the game shows what separates Bioshock Infinite from the rest.

Elizabeth is an AI character who follows Booker around Columbia, but she is much different than the AIs from other games; Elizabeth is probably the most helpful to date. Her abilities and skills are never a nuisance and often can give gamers a tactical advantage. Her most unique ability is her

ability to open "tears." These "tears" are rips in space and time that can bring in objects or items from other dimensions or other times. She can make Med Packs, walls, turrets, decoys, ammo, and much more into the world in order to help Booker. Tears are essential and gamers will find it hard to get by without using this ability.

Another ability that Elizabeth has is lock-picking. In the main storyline, there are a handful of times when Elizabeth must pick a lock to get to the next area, but there are also locks that branch off into rooms that always have useful items for gamers to collect. The locks that tie in with the story are free to use, but all the branching off ones require a certain amount of lock-picks which gamers will find scattered all over the city.

The last reason Elizabeth is essential to your survival is how she scavenges the city. Since she doesn't fight off enemies, she is constantly looking for weapons, health, Salts (the replacement for Eve that powers your Vigors), and Silver Eagles (the currency). Whenever you are in combat, Elizabeth may shout to you saying she found something. By holding the X Button (for Xbox users), Booker will turn to Elizabeth and she'll throw whatever she found over to him. Elizabeth will always throw exactly what gamers need too; she will never throw money to gamers in the middle of a fight. If Booker is running low on ammo for his pistol, she'll throw a pistol to him; if he's low on health, she'll throw a Med Pack over; if his Salts have run dry, she would have found salts to replenish them. This ability is the most useful because it will allow gamers to stay in the fight when things start looking bleak.

Elizabeth is a smart AI, too. When exploring the city, she will never just stand there and wait for gamers to move on; she walks over to displays and she'll interact with them or say something about them. Also, gamers will never have

to defend Elizabeth in combat because she can take care of herself by hiding behind cover and avoiding enemies. She will never feel like a burden; instead, she is a crucial companion.

Another element of the game that adds to its uniqueness is the Skylines. Early on, Booker acquires a Sky Hook which serves as the melee weapon of the game, but it also is a tool that can be used to ride the Skylines, the roller-coaster like rails in the sky. Booker and Elizabeth can both ride them to escape out of tight situations and get to higher grounds or to a different location. Booker isn't invincible on the rails, though. Enemies can ride the rails too, which creates the most creative fighting environment. Using the Skylines will be required later on, so it is a skill Booker needs.

The weapons and Vigor system has also changed from the weapon and Plasmid system. In the originals, gamers would hit the bumpers on the controller to cycle through Plasmids and weapons. Gamers would hold down the bumpers which pauses the game in order for gamers to switch directly to a weapon. In Infinite, gamers have two weapons set to the cycle and two Vigors. Booker doesn't grab a weapon and hold on to it for the remainder of the game like Jack and Subject Delta did. Instead, he can only hold on to two weapons at a time and can switch them for a weapon on the ground. He can pick up the ammo for weapons he doesn't have, so if he ever switches weapons, he won't be limited to the ammo left in that weapon. For Vigors, the system is still alike to the previous. Though gamers can only cycle through two Vigors, if they hold down the bumper, the game will pause to manually choose a Vigor to replace the Vigor in one of the two Vigor slots. It may sound like the weapon system and Vigor system was setback by limiting the cycle to two of each, but it serves as a more realistic system for weapons and flows well with

gameplay.

Though not as tough or frightening as a Big Daddy, Infinite has what are called "Heavy Hitters." The two Heavy Hitters that appear frequently throughout the game are the HandyMan and the Motorized Patriot. The Handy Man is a man who was put into a body made out of prosthetics and metal. His hands are big enough for him to hold a man around his waist and his legs allow for high jumps and fast dashes forward. He only has two parts remaining from his previous body: his messed up face and his heart. His heart serves as his weak point and is where Booker can score extra damage for a quicker kill.

The Motorized Patriot is a robot with one of the Founding Father's faces. It carries around a chain gun that can only be related to an earlier model of the "Death Machine" featured in "Black Ops." His weak point is his gears in his back, but getting to his back-side can be difficult.

Another Heavy Hitter is the "Siren." She is the spirit of a dead character who has the ability to bring dead enemies back to life. She doesn't attack you directly, but the enemies she spawns will. The only way to quickly end the fight is to focus on the Siren herself, because once she is defeated, the enemies she revived will fall.

The last Heavy Hitter also does not attack Booker directly. In fact, Booker doesn't even kill him. The "Boys of Silence" is a man with giant irons heads who is surrounded by demented, pale-white men who stand completely still. The iron headed man scans the room, and if he spots Booker, he screams to alert those surrounding him. He then disappears and leaves the rest of them. The best way to deal with them is to avoid the Boy's gaze. Just like the predecessors, there are machines that act as in-game stores. "Dollar Bill" allows gamers to buy back a certain percent of health, Salts, and ammunition. The Vigor Vending Machine sells

up to two upgrades for each Vigor. These upgrades are very expensive, but greatly improve their effectiveness. The Armory Vending Machine sells up to four upgrades for each weapon. Upgrades include more damage, more ammo in a clip, and several more improvements.

Aside from the traditional "Easy, Medium, Hard" modes of Infinite, gamers will unlock a mode called "1999 Mode," after completion of the game on any difficulty. It's on the same level of difficulty as Hard, but it comes with one added twist. The decisions gamers make in combat or throughout the story can affect what happens next. Of course, the storyline won't vary from its path, but gamers may be put in unwinnable situations where they will die and have to respawn.

The setting and combat of the game isn't the only thing that has changed. Bioshock's iconic character, the "Big Daddy," has been replaced by a bigger and more menacing foe called the "Songbird." Songbird is a mechanical bird that served as Elizabeth's friend and warden when she was trapped inside Monument Island. Naturally, he isn't too happy about Booker breaking her out.

Infinite has a lot to do with space and time due to Elizabeth's ability to open tears and because of this, there are a lot of "easter eggs" where gamers can see or hear things from a different time. One example is that Booker passes by an area where he hears the song "Girls Just Want to Have Fun," a 1979 song playing for a short period of time before abruptly leaving. Keep in mind that this game takes place in 1912, so that song is completely foreign to the characters of this game.

What saddened gamers in the year prior to its release was the announcement that there would be no Multiplayer Mode. The Multiplayer in "Bioshock 2" was unique and exciting to play with friends. Though it was drowned out by multiplayer in games like "Call of Duty" and "Battlefield," it was an amazing experience. Gamers were hoping for a Multiplayer with the Skylines and Heavy Hitters involved, but none were made.

All in all, "Bioshock Infinite" is a spectacular game with an ending that will leave all staring in awe with their jaws to the floor and their minds trying to wrap around what exactly happened. Booker and Elizabeth's adventure is one to remember. Though no multiplayer mode was implemented in the game, its campaign is deeper and more mind-blowing than any before it. Sixty dollars is a small price to pay for this rewarding experience.

The team consists of eight coed members and plays 16 regular season matches.

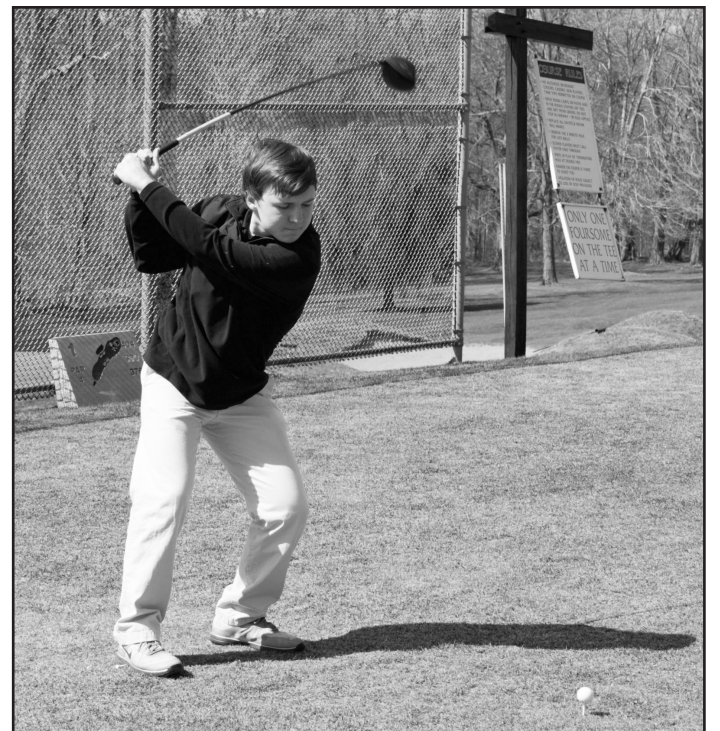
The team had a record of 9-7 last year and plays their home matches at Orange Hills Country Club.
